AVOIDING CONFLICT WITH NEIGHBORS

We all **can** just get along. The key? Communication. It's often the best way to prevent and resolve conflict before it reaches the legal system. You don't have to be friends or spend time together to achieve a peaceful coexistence, but you should try to be a good neighbor and follow these tips:

Say hello. At the mailbox, while walking the dog or when you see a moving van arrive, introduce yourself. Learn your neighbor's names and regularly offer a friendly greeting.

Provide a heads up. If you're planning a construction project, altering your landscaping or hosting a big party, contact your neighbors beforehand.

Do unto others. Treat neighbors as you would like to be treated. Be considerate about noise from vehicles, stereos, pets, etc.

Know your differences. Make an effort to understand each other. Differences in age, ethnic background and years in the neighborhood can lead to different expectations or

misunderstandings.

Consider the view. Keep areas that others can see presentable.

Appreciate them. If the neighbors do something you like, let them know. They'll be pleased you noticed, and it'll be easier to talk later if they do something you don't like.

Stay positive. Most people don't try to create problems. If a neighbor does something that irritates you, don't assume it was deliberate.

Talk honestly. Tolerance is important, but don't let a real irritation go because it seems unimportant or hard to discuss. Let your neighbors know if something they do annoys you.

Be respectful. Talk directly to your neighbors if there's a problem. Gossiping with others can damage relationships and create trouble.

Listen carefully. When discussing a problem, try to understand your neighbor's position and why he or she feels that way.

POLICING AFTER YOUR DOG

Dog Waste Poses Threat

For as long as the dog has been man's best friend, dog waste has posed a menace to man's nose and foot. Now science has revealed a more unsavory truth: It's an environmental pollutant.

In the mid-1990s, scientists perfected methods for tracking the origin of nasty bacteria in streams and seawater. From Clearwater, FL to Arlington, VA to Boise, ID the trail has led straight to the hunched-up dog -- and to owners who don't pick up after their pets. Many dog lovers are in denial about their pooches' leavings. But researchers have named the idea that areas used by dogs pump more bacteria into waterways -- the "Fido hypothesis."

Dogs are only one of many fixtures of suburban America that add to water pollution. Lawn fertilizers, rinse water from driveways and motor oil commonly end up in streams and lakes. But unlike those sources, dogs generate disease-causing bacteria that can make people sick. It doesn't take a Ph.D to figure out that dog do is nasty. But it took science to determine how nasty it is.

From mutt to blue-blooded champion, all dogs harbor so-called coliform bacteria, which live in the gut. The group includes E.coli, a bacterium that can cause disease, and fecal coliform bacteria, which spread through feces. Dogs also carry salmonella and giardia. This wouldn't matter if pet dogs were as rare as pet chinchillas. But four in 10 U.S. households include at least one dog, according to the American Pet Products Manufacturers Association.

Those numbers add up to a lot of kibble. That wouldn't matter if all dog owners also owned a pooper-scooper. But several studies have found that roughly 40% of Americans don't pick up their dogs' feces (women are more likely to do so than men).

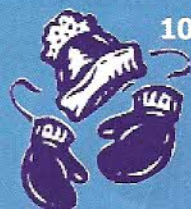

Winter Safety Tips



Pets

- Do not leave your pet alone in a car.
- Antifreeze is lethal to dogs and cats.
- Be sure to immediately clean up any spills.
- Do not let your pet off its leash on snow or ice, especially during a snowstorm.
- Thoroughly wipe off your dog's paws, legs and stomach to prevent it from ingesting salt, antifreeze or other potentially dangerous chemicals while licking its paws.
- Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter, as a longer coat will provide more warmth.
- After bathing your pet, make sure it is completely dry before allowing it to go outside.

People

- Wear loose-fitting, layered clothes and water-repellent outer garments.
- Cover your mouth to protect your lungs from cold air.
- Drink water and other fluids to avoid dehydration.
- Watch for signs of frostbite, such as a "pins and needles" feeling, followed by numbness.
- Watch for signs of hypothermia, which include uncontrolled shivering, slow speech, memory loss, stumbling, sleepiness and extreme tiredness.

Checklists:

Home

- Ensure proper ventilation for gas-fueled heating devices.
- Never use an extension cord to connect a space heater to an outlet.
- Unplug space heaters when not in use.
- Look for heating devices with automatic shutoff features.
- Have wood and coal stoves, fireplaces, and chimneys inspected and cleaned by a professional each year.
- Seal and weather-strip doors and windows.
- Insulate walls and attics.
- Clear gutters and repair roof leaks.
- Insulate pipes with insulation or newspaper and plastic.
- Allow faucets to drip a little during cold weather to avoid freezing.
- Learn how to shut off water valves in case a pipe bursts.

Vehicles

- Maintain at least a half-tank of gas during the winter season.
- Place a winter emergency kit in each car.
- Check your antifreeze levels, battery and ignition system, brakes, exhaust, fuel, air filter, heater and defroster, lights, oil, thermostat, and windshield wipers.

- Prepare your car for winter. Start with a checkup that includes:
 - Checking the ignition, brakes, wiring, hoses and fan belts.
 - Changing and adjusting the spark plugs.
 - Checking the air, fuel and emission filters, and the PCV valve.
 - Inspecting the distributor.

- Checking the battery.
- Checking the tires for air, sidewall wears and treads depth.
- Checking the antifreeze level and the freeze line.

Your car should have a tune-up (check the owner's manual for the recommended interval) to ensure better gas mileage, quicker starts and faster response on pick-up and passing over.

Weather

At any temperature -- 20 degrees Fahrenheit below zero or 90 degrees Fahrenheit above -- weather affects road and driving conditions and can pose serious problems.

It is important to listen to forecasts on radio, TV, cable weather channel, or forecasts in the daily papers.

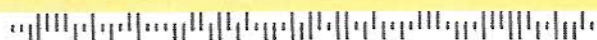
